#### Studying A level German at Huish Episcopi- Overview

## Literary texts and films

By the end of the Upper Sixth, students must also study two texts **or** one text and one film from a list provided by AQA. While the focus in the run-up to the Lower Sixth examination is on language and topic work, students will begin to study both cultural topics in the Summer Term. They will also begin their research on their chosen topic for their speaking exam.

## Transition to Upper Sixth

Lower Sixth students will start considering A2 and HE choices. Information should be offered on German courses, with an emphasis on film and literary study after the more language-based Lower Sixth examination.

#### How the course is assessed

#### A Level German Examinations taken at the end of Year 13

#### Paper 1: Listening, Reading and Writing 2h30 50% of A Level

- 1. Listening: questions in German to be answered with non-verbal responses or in German.
- 2. Reading: as above . Translation into English: 100 words max 4. Translation into German: 100 words max

#### Paper 2: Writing 2h 20% of A Level

2 Essays. Answer one question in German on a set text from a choice of two and one question in German on a set film from a choice of two.

#### Paper 3: Speaking 25minutes 30% of A Level

- 1. Discussion of a sub-theme (5-6 min) with the discussion based on a stimulus card. You study the card for 5 min before the test begins.
- 2. Presentation (2 min) and discussion (9-10 min) of individual research project.







#### How the course is delivered

- You will be taught for 8 hours per fortnight by two teachers.
- -You will cover the themes with your teachers using the AQA-linked textbook by Oxford University Press, online resources and a variety of other supplementary material.
- Your teachers will cover all necessary grammar, the literature study, the film study and the independent research project over your two year course.

#### Departmental expectations

- -Students will attend all classes.
- -Students will be expected to learn vocabulary and grammar for regular tests in class.
- Students will meet deadlines for all homework and will do individual study of at least one hour for each hour of classes. -Teachers will contact parents if any issues with deadlines or work completion arise.
- Work must be organised systematically in files and exercise books.
- Individual study must include all four skills of listening, speaking, reading and writing, using a variety of resources.

## Summer Key Skills Tasks

Your summer holiday key skills tasks: there are 3 tasks to complete. They should ALL be ready to be handed in for marking and discussion by the 11th September 2017:

#### A. Watch the film The Reader in English.

Once you have watched it, choose one of the following tasks to complete:

- Write a review of the film in German of 150-200 words.
- Choose one part of the film and write a synopsis in German of 150-200 words.
- Imagine you are Michael. Write a diary entry explaining how you feel about Hannah.

#### B. Complete the activity below.

Research a topic that interests you from a German news/current affairs website such as www. spiegel.de or news-und-trends.de and write a synopsis in German. You must be prepared to talk about it in small groups in German  $\square$  Consider the following questions when writing your synopsis:

- Why did you choose this article? "ich habe diesen Artikel gewählt, weil...."
- Why does it interest you? "Ich finde ihn interessant weil.....?"
- What is it about? "Es geht um...."
- What are the key points? "Erstens....Zweitens...."
- Do you agree with the ideas? Why/Why not? "Ich stimme dem Artikel zu / nicht zu weil....."
- C. Complete the grammar exercises provided by your teacher.
