- Which of the other famous Victorians is he compared to?
- What single item is his most valuable contribution to British Political life, which is still used today?
- Which aspect of Economics was he most interested in and why?
- Why was Economics called Political Economy at that time?
- One of his most influential contemporary contributors to Economic Theory, at that time, was John Stuart Mill. What aspect of Economic Thought is he most associated with?

The answers to these questions will provide you with an important foundation to the start of the course and it will also provide you with a unique connection between Langport and the foundations of the subject!! Enjoy (3)
